Bennett spends most days in the field, planting, cultivating and harvesting produce for his tight-knit island community. He also runs the business end of the operation, which uses natural methods of farming, focusing on creating clean, fair food. In addition to farming, Bennett's passions lay with agrarian music, including work songs and traditional banjo. Along with singing occasionally in the fields, Bennett plays dances and concerts and teaches workshops. Bennett hopes to develop the farm into a place where people can come experience and learn about the history and culture of food in the fields, in the kitchen and at the table.

And a connection there is: Henry Hudson stopped briefly at the island 400 years ago, before continuing his voyage to the new world. Coincidentally, the pedigree of the very first sheep raised on Sylvester Manor in New York, dates far back, to the island of Texel!

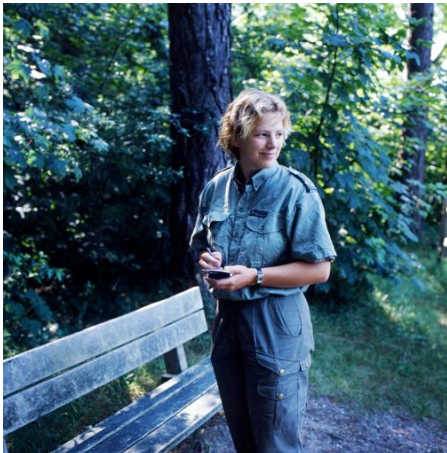
PARTICIPANTS**Parkranger x Boswachter**
